

BOB BRUGGER, GUEST SPEAKER

Robert "Bob" Brugger was born in Fair Oaks in June of 1943 to Frank and Katherine Brugger. His father, Frank, was manager of the Pacific Cement and Aggregate Plant across the river in Fair Oaks. It was one of the largest employers in Fair Oaks. The whole town woke up to the starting of the crushers.

Brugger graduated from Fair Oaks Grammar School in 1957. He played Little League in Fair Oaks for 4 years and then played baseball at San Juan High School, from which he graduated in 1961. He received the Trades and Industrial Arts Honor Award. He graduated from American River Junior College in 1963.

Like his father, Brugger worked for the Pacific Cement and Aggregate Plant/ Lone Star Industries (now Cemex) for 37 years as a heavy-duty diesel mechanic. He was known in the industry for his expertise in diesel repair and often called upon for technical advice.

In 1964, he married his high school sweetheart Maria Ferris.

Brugger was drafted into the Army in 1965 and sent to Vietnam for a year where he received the Army Commendation Medal for meritorious service. He returned to PCA when he was discharged.



He moved to what was left of his mother's family homestead in Shingle Springs in 1979 where the family has lived for the last 45 years, but he has maintained his connection to Fair Oaks.

Bob and Maria have been married for 60 years. They have two sons and four grandchildren. The oldest is an architect/builder in Napa and the younger is a geneticist in Los Angeles. The oldest grandson is a public defense lawyer in Portland, Oregon, and the oldest granddaughter is in New York looking to get into musical theater. The two youngest, in Los Angeles, are in high school and grammar school.

The Brugger Family emigrated to Folsom in the late 1800s. His grandfather was a miner. Bob loves to hunt and fish, and is known for his knowledge of the area's history.


This is the first of a three-part series on Fair Oaks and projects by the Works Progress Administration, later called the Works Project Administration and referred to as the WPA.

Before the WPA, California had the State Emergency Relief Administration (SERA), started in 1933, and then the State Relief Administration (SRA) took its place in 1935.

On May 6, 1935, President Franklin D. Roosevelt created the **WPA** a \$4,000,000 federal work program. The Depression-era program's goal was to provide employment to as many people as possible at their local prevailing wage. To ensure maximum employment in an area, employees were limited to 8 hours a day (or 40 hours a week) but were also guaranteed a minimum of 30 hours a week (or 120 hours per month). Some adjustments were made for music, art, and drama projects.

All persons who were employed on the WPA work program had to be: 1) registered for employment with the national reemployment of state employment office in his residence locality; 2) on relief as of May 31, 1935; 3) at least 16 years of age; 4) able-bodied; and 5) not currently serving a sentence

in a penal of correctional insti-



One of the local WPA projects was a woman's sewing class where 15 or so women were employed five days a week. The class was held in the basement of the Fair Oaks Federated Church. During February 1936 the program produced 6586 garments in Sacramento County, which were given to 1110 county residents.

Another local project received \$8,000 from the WPA for continuation of the construction of road shoulders on both Minnesota Avenue and Fair Oaks Boulevard from Fair Oaks Grammar School (@Winding Way and Fair Oaks Blvd location) north to Greenback Lane. All the work was done on new grades only and not on maintenance work.

Another project at Fair Oaks Grammer School started as a SERA project then became a WPA project and received a WPA grant of \$18,000. The total project would cost \$20,000. The work started in April 1936 and finished in August 1936. More than 5,000 cubic yards of dirt was moved from the hill behind the school to make a level area for a new playground and athletic

fields. They also eliminated rock terraces on the southeast corner of the property to make way for a tennis court and an outdoor stage (an idea of principal Edward P. Buchanan). Landscaping plans included a grove of trees that would act as a windbreak, as well as an outdoor fireplace constructed within the grove, and turf covering two-thirds of the new ground. The playground was constructed on a blacktop surface. A refinished roof and two additional classrooms rounded out the project.

People working on both the road and at the grammar school were paid regardless of the weather conditions. However, this meant that there was a possibility the money would run out before the job was done. There was the possibility of using county equipment to expedite the work but only when funds were available from other sources to pay the cost of equipment operators, gas, and oil bills. I didn't find anything that said that the funds ran out.

In 1938 a roving WPA crew of 16 men was established in the Fair Oaks district. The men were transported from point to point in a county truck to clean up numerous odds and ends.

In February 1936, 215 people transferred from relief rolls to private employment. On December 4, 1942, the WPA was abolished by Presidential letter effective June 20, 1943, because full employment resulted during World War II.
