The Marshall Diary Jim Pearce

Alfred F. Marshall was an original Fair Oaks Colony buyer. He evidently read about the Fair Oaks Colony in the Howard & Wilson advertisements in Farm, Field and Fireside, as he is listed in the 1897 advertising brochure as an initial purchaser of land in Fair Oaks. He probably travelled to Fair Oaks on one of the "Excursion" trains bringing potential buyers from the East to the Colony. By 1903 he is living in Fair Oaks at the corner of Magnolia and Minnesota Avenues.

Remarkably, from 1906 to 1935 he kept a diary, making entries of what he did every day, often quite simplistic, and of course all handwritten. The diary has been in the custody of the Marshall family. Even more remarkable, in the late 1990's Marshall's great grandson Gene Schroeder started a ten year project to transcribe the 275 page diary into a computer. He finished in 2014, a copy of which he and his wife Georgia donated to the Fair Oaks Historical Society in January, 2015. They also provided the computer files, which make the entire set of journals word-searchable.

He was a lifelong carpenter, working on many projects in Fair Oaks including the rebuilding of the Slocum & Gore store and bank, projects at the Olive Plant, and numerous home building jobs for local residents. The fact that Gene put the entire diary into a word processor makes all the entries searchable on names places and any other word is invaluable for our research.

The diaries are available at the History Center.





The Woman's Thursday Club of Fair Oaks, 1952

The Woman's Thursday Club of Fair Oaks was organized in 1902. The archive of this club contains scrapbooks of newspaper clippings which highlight club activities throughout the years. Some photographs are preserved such as the one accompanying this article.

This photo shows Thursday Club directors and officers from 1952.

Directors are standing. They are (left to right): Mrs. Earl LeGette, Mrs. B.R. Kerns, Mrs. F.H. Hayes, Mrs. E.K. Rabitte, Mrs. C. Fahey, and Mrs. I.O. Rice.

Officers are seated. They are (left to right): Mrs. J. Fryer (President), Mrs. F. Campoy, Jr. (Treasurer), Mrs. Wesley McCormick (Vice President), and Mrs. N. L. Langness (Installing Officer).

The Woman's Club of Fair Oaks was a member of the Sacramento County Federation of Woman's Clubs. The Fair Oaks group sometimes met with the Woman's Tuesday Club of Sacramento.

The two clubs met jointly to open the 1952-1953 program year. An article from *The Sacramento Bee* (October 15, 1952) records that the speaker for this meeting was Beach Vasey, legislative secretary to Governor Earl Warren. His presentation was titled, "A Voter Views His Ballot."

The Sacramento Bee (October 11, 1952) also identified a speaker who presented at another Thursday Club meeting: Jeanne DeVivier. Jeanne DeVivier was an interviewer for "At Your Service" which was broadcast on Sacramento's radio station KFBK.



Remembering Harry Voth

We recently were reminded of Harry Voth by a contribution to the Historical Society of \$2854.28 from the Harry J. and Leisa G. Voth Fund of the Sacramento Region Community Foundation, an organization that raises money to support area non-profits. Harry designated the Fair Oaks Historical Society as the recipient of any proceeds that result from his fund.

Harry was the first president of the Society when it was formed in 1975 and continued to serve the Society and other local organizations over the years until his death in 2003.

Harry is somewhat infamous for his comments in a series of articles in the Chamber newsletter "Enterprise" in 1985 that "attendance at FOHS meetings began to diminish – to the point it became embarrassing to ask speakers to address such small audiences. Today the Society is moribund. Only the officers meet, and that occasionally."



Harry didn't give up, and in a meeting of the Board in 1985, it was decided to change the meetings to quarterly from monthly and have a potluck dinner with a speaker. Word got out, and over 50 people signed up for the first meeting in 1986. The meeting location had to be changed from the Thursday Club building to the Community Clubhouse to accommodate the crowd. The next meeting drew over 80 people. The meetings grew over the years from 80 to over 100.

Harry continues to support the Historical Society posthumously through the Voth fund at the Sacramento Community Foundation which regularly sends a contribution to the Society.
