

Dear Members,

First, I want to show thanks to several of our members who have made generous donations to the Fair Oaks Historical Society. As you all know, we just replaced the roof at the History Center. During the process, we discovered there was additional work that was required before the new roof could be installed. The total cost of the new roof was over \$14,000. Fortunately, we had two significant contributions that helped cover much of the cost. Thank you to Thomas and Hedda Smithson (\$10,000) and to the Harry J. and Liesa G. Voth Fund (\$2,500) for their generous support. The FOHS Board is very thankful! And many thanks to Bud Beebe, our History Center Facilities Manager, for overseeing the project from start to finish.

Regarding expenses, with the end of the year fast approaching, many of us who have IRA's fall into the Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) trap. If you are looking to reduce the taxes on that distribution, please consider making a direct payment (Qualified Charitable Distribution) to the Fair Oaks Historical Society (a qualified 501(c)(3) non-profit organiza-

tion). Just contact your IRA broker



and they can write a check from the cash portion of your IRA. Or some brokers will give you a checkbook so you can write a check. It's very easy to do and those **QCD donations are fully deductible** from the taxable income on your 1040-SR line 4b.

and the benefit is that you get to meet very nice people and learn more about our little town.





## THE FLAG AT SAILOR BAR

Shortly after moving to Fair Oaks in 1999, we discovered the amazing trails down by Sailor Bar. On one of our walks, we came up on a woman working around the base of the flag pole and asked what she was doing. She explained that her father had been maintaining the memorial site built for her brother, Stephen Moore. Unfortunately, her father's health was declining and this would require him to move to Texas so she could take care of him. She was very upset that no one would be able to tend to the memorial once he moved.

Hearing how upset she was, my husband, Richard and I told her that we would make sure the flag was maintained, and that we would try to reach out to some of the local Boy Scout troops to see that the area around the flag pole was maintained. Needless to say, she was thrilled to know that the tradition started by her father would continue.

That Father's Day, my father, who was a World War II and Korean War Veteran was visiting us for Father's Day. We brought him down to the flag and told him that we would now be maintaining the flag to honor Stephen Moore as well as him, and other veterans of foreign wars. I was totally surprised by how emotional my dad became.



For about five years, we worked with the local fire departments to come down and replace the flag when it became rather worn and did have a local Boy Scout Troop come a few times to do any gardening and landscaping. We're hoping to have that happen again soon. And if you've had a chance to climb up to the flag pole, you'll notice that there are some benches placed for visitors to sit and reflect and enjoy the landscape which were provided by Jim Racy when he still had his garden store.

For at least the last five years two members of our neighborhood, Matt Walbeck, and Dean Halstead, have taken over that task and also added the California flag. Recently, there was some discussion about moving the pole to a different location, but with the support of Supervisor Rich Desmond, Fair Oaks Park & Rec as well as the county it looks like the flag will stay where it is and there may even be a facelift and some renovation around the area.

The caption you will find by the flag pole reads:

Stephen D Moore, Eagle Scout, ...to do my duty to God and my country, ...Troop 56, Golden Empire Council, Boy Scouts of American.

Will keep you updated on the plans for the future of the Sailor Bar flag.



## FROM THE ARCHIVES

A pump organ was donated to the Fair Oaks Historical Society that was in the Beers Family for around 100 years. George Howard Beers was born in Genoa, Nevada on December 27, 1896, to Howard and Lillian Beers. George caught a case of measles in his second year at Reno High School. After recovering instead of going back to finish school he helped his dad in Carson Valley. Drilling artesian wells for the ranchers. On December 3, 1917, George joined the Aviation Section of the United States Signal Corps in Reno. He spent time at the airfield in Chipping, Sodbury, England repairing aircraft. After military service he returned to working with his dad drilling wells in Nevada.

Grace Florence Penrose was born in Wabuska, Nevada on November 9, 1901, to William and Alpha Penrose. In 1920 Grace and other family women all stormed the Capitol in Carson City to be in the chamber when they voted to ratify the 19<sup>th</sup> amendment (women's right to vote). Nevada ratified the amendment on that day.

George met Grace, daughter of one of the ranchers having a well drilled. They were married in Reno on June 6, 1920, and lived in Genoa, Nevada while George worked a mining claim. During this time Margie was born. The threesome made the move to Washington state where first Alpha Ellen and then Doris were born. They all moved back to Nevada where Jean was born the fourth and last child.

George found work at mining camps all around Northern California until the Great Depression which made work hard to find. The family moved back to George's parent's ranch in Wabuska, Nevada until summer of 1936 when the U.S. Chrome Company offered George a job building an ore crusher at Negro Hill on the road between Mormon Island and Rattlesnake Bar Bridge. He became the superintendent of the site. They first moved to Sacramento then in the fall of same year moved to Fair Oaks on a street that the 1940 census called Sacramento Hill (most likely where Sacramento Street meets Hill Street).

In winter of 1936 Jean came down with scarlet fever requiring the house to be quarantined for 21 days. The other three girls were away at school the day the house was quarantined, so they stayed away at other homes until the quarantine was lifted and Jean fully recovered. After World War II, George and Grace bought a

two-story Victorian house at 7816 Sunset Ave. George transformed the barn into his workshop. He held U.S. and foreign patents on metallurgical processes. Grace also had space to throw pottery, a skill she passed on to her grandkids.

George Beers cousin Georgina Millay had a pump organ on her enclosed front porch. As a child, Doris of-

ten played it. Doris in time was to have the organ to play to her own kids and later to even her great grandkids. Doris Beers Breemer's granddaughters, Kimberly Hewel and Gina Gray, donated the organ to the Fair Oaks Historical Society. It is now in the History Museum.

Like big races we were registered and wore tags of our age group, and were awarded a medal for just finishing, plus a special award for placing in the top three. Well, this given year I was over 80 and in the 80+ men's group. It seemed like 20 miles rather than 5, whereas in previous years when I was younger and was able to enjoy the people and scenery.

However, as I arrived at the finish line, and when the results were posted, I found that I had placed first and won my age group. Special: Right?

But, now the rest of the story. I WAS THE ONLY RUNNER IN THE OVER 80 MENS DIVISION!
